# Today Marks Women Vets Recognition Day

Today is Women Veterans Recognition Day. Observed annually on June 12, the day celebrates the contributions made by women who have served in the United States military. Today also marks the anniversary of the Women's Armed Services Integration Act of 1948, which granted women permanent military status.

Post 201 is recognizing all women veterans today, whether members of the Post or not, by reducing all drink prices at the bar by \$1 for women veterans and those who are currently serving on active duty or who are in the National Guard or Reserves. For those who may drink only soft drinks, dollar-off price translates into any soda produced by the bar's "gun," and normally sold for \$1, will be free today for any qualified woman.

### Background

Women have served in the U.S. military throughout its history, initially in non-combat roles and later expanding into combat-related positions. The 1948 Integration Act officially allowed women

to serve in all branches of the military.

Over time, women in the U.S. military have gradually gained access to more and more military job classifications, eventually including combat positions. Today women make up about 17.5 per cent of the active-duty force and 21.4 percent of the National Guard and Reserves.

### Key Milestones and Stats

- More than 300,000 women have served in Iraq and Afghanistan since Sept. 11, 2001.
- Over 9,000 women have earned Combat Action Badges.
- Women make up about 33 per cent of DoD civilians.
- More than two million women veterans currently live in the U.S. .
- General Ann E. Dunwoody was the first female four-star general in the Army, serving as a commander in the 82nd Airborne Division.
- Captain Linda Bray was the first woman to lead U.S. troops into combat during Operation Just Cause in Panama in 1989. She was one of more than 700 women who participated in the operation.
- Captain Kristen Griest and 1st Lieutenant Shaye Haver were the first female soldiers to successfully complete the U.S. Army's Ranger School at Fort Benning, Ga.
- General Lori Robinson was the first female officer to command a major Unified Combatant Command.
- Michelle J. Howard was the first woman to become a U.S. Navy four-star admiral and the first African American and woman to hold the post of Vice Chief of Naval Operations.

#### Most Difficult Branch Evaluation

The Marine Corps is often considered the most challenging branch of the military for women, due to its rigorous training standards and physically demanding roles. While the Army also offers physically demanding opportunities, the Marines are generally seen as the most difficult of the branches in terms of overall training intensity.

The Air Force is often seen as the least physically demanding branch, but it's also the most challenging to get into due to its high educational requirements. The Navy and Army present a mix of physical demands and opportunities, making them more varied in terms of difficulty.

Ultimately, the "hardest" branch for a woman to join depends on individual preferences and goals. Some may find the physical demands of the Marines or Army to be more challenging. The Navy is generally considered a middle ground in terms of overall difficulty, while others may find the Air Force's high educational requirements the most demanding.

**Executive Committee OK's Draft FY 25-26 Budget - -** Members of the Post will be asked to approve the Post's proposed FY 25-26 budget at next Tuesday night's general membership meeting. A copy of the budget will be posted on the Clubroom's bulletin board prior to the Clubroom/Bar opening this afternoon.

The budget assumes that the Post's total income for the year will be \$669,000.00. Cost of Goods sold during the year are projected to be \$322,250.00. This line item primarily incudes liquor, mixers, food for concessions, DJ's and band expenses, and staff salaries.

Other expenses, which include taxes, casual labor, insurance, Post and baseball utilities, community outreach activities, scholarships, general office and cleanup supplies, equipment rentals, Post baseball field and yard maintenance, general repairs and maintenance, and repayment of the SBA (Covid time frame loan to keep the Post open), and licenses and fees to conduct business are estimated to be \$331,400.00.

The combination of the cost of sales and other expenses leave a projected net FY 25-25 income of \$15,350.00.

**Parking Policy Adopted** - - The Executive Committee unanimously approved a Parking Policy for the Post this past Tuesday which will take effect on Aug. 1. A copy of the policy is posted on the Clubroom/Bar bulletin board. The policy defines the rules and restrictions for all parking areas, both marked and unmarked and outlines procedures under which vehicles left on the property for extended periods could be towed at the owners expense. Recently the Post has needed to address issues of unidentified vehicles being left on Post property for an extended period.
