# **Independence Day Schedule at Post 201**

- The Post's Clubroom/Bar will open at 1 p.m. tomorrow.
- Members of the general public are always welcome on the Post's grounds. They are also welcome in the Post's Clubroom/Bar from 1 p.m.. until after the Wills Park fireworks show.
- Auxiliary Unit 201 will be selling 4th of July 50/50 raffle tickets. The winner's name will be drawn prior to the Wills Parks fireworks. Tickets are one for \$5, three for \$10, or 10 for \$20. You do not have to be present at the drawing to win.
- The baseball field concession stand will be open from 5 p.m. until 9 p.m. selling hamburgers and hotdogs. The SAL is responsible for concession stand activities this year.

- At 6:30 p.m. the all-volunteer Alpharetta City Band will start playing patriotic music for your enjoyment on the front lawn.
- The Highway 9 Band will be providing music for dancing in the Post ballroom. Hustle dance lessons start at 7:30 p.m. followed by open dance starting at 8 p.m. Admission is \$12 per person cash or credit.
- Wills Park fireworks, which can be seen from the Post's Walk of Memories and baseball
  field, are scheduled to start when the sky is dark, which should be in the 9:15 p.m. time
  frame.

### Additional 'Need to Know' Information

- All alcoholic beverages sold on the 4th will be sold at the Clubroom/Bar.
- Volunteers are still needed to help marshal cars and collect a \$10 per car parking fee from those coming to the Post to watch the fireworks and listen to the Alpharetta City Band. If you can help with parking, contact Post Commander Bob Byrd.
- Members of the Post Family or members of other American Legion Posts (which includes SAL and Auxiliary members) who have and present a current 2025 Legion, Auxiliary or SAL membership card do not have to pay the \$10 parking fee. Don't forget to have your membership card with you.
- For those not familiar with the Post's safety and beverage rules, alcoholic beverages may not be brought onto the Post's grounds. Consumer fireworks, charcoal grills and small propane grills are also prohibited on Post grounds.

## What was Different on the 5th of July?

There was no difference between July 3, 1776, and July 5. By all outward appearances, the American colonies were no more free and no more independent. Practically speaking, the governing structures were not different.

So what makes the Fourth of July so special?

Think about it. We do not celebrate October 19, 1781, the date the war for American independence ended. There are no parades commemorating September 3, 1783, when the Treaty of Paris formally concluded the war.

No, we celebrate July 4, 1776. That is the day when our Founding Fathers firmly, finally, and officially committed themselves—their lives, their fortunes, their sacred honor—to the cause of American liberty.

Now, make no mistake: many of them had done so personally and individually weeks, months, even years earlier. They already had an army, and blood had already been shed.

Yet, the Fourth of July is celebrated because that is when they formally, out loud, with one voice, declared their independence. They acknowledged to each other and a "candid world" that they were dissolving their political ties with England.

We celebrate their commitment to the fight. It is a recognition that, in the most important ways, by choosing to declare their independence, they had already achieved it.

Nearly all of our Founding Fathers were men of faith; they understood that the struggle upon which they were to engage may or may not be successful in the eyes of the world. That didn't matter; they achieved freedom in their choice, declared on the Fourth of July, and the fight ahead was merely the necessary consequence.

On Independence Day, we celebrate our Founding Fathers' commitment to the ideals of self-governance. On Independence Day, we celebrate their willingness to exercise their convictions for themselves and for us.

On this Independence Day, let us recommit ourselves to their founding convictions. Let us recognize that refusing to accept the yoke of tyranny is the highest expression of liberty.

As it was in 1776, so it is today. The real difference between July 3rd and July 5th is what we commit ourselves to on the Fourth of July.
